8. Decent work & economic growth	Achieved great progress.		Disrupted the global economy, pushing the world into a recession.
9. Industry, innovation and infrastructure	Achieved great progress.		Manufacturers hardly hit and causing disruptions in global value chains and the supply of products.
10. Reduce Inequalities	Some progress.	WIIII	Poorest and most vulnerable people hardest hit

11. Sustainable Cities	Rapid urbanization resulting in inadequate and overburdened infrastructure and services, and worsening air pollution.		Hardest hit for housing under shared toilets, little or no waste management systems
12. sustainable consumption and production patterns	Between 2010 to 2019, per capita - material consumption + 7% - e-waste generation + 38% - One-third of food is lost/ wasted	///	Consumption and production reduced but online shopping increased packaging and small lots delivery. Hygiene waste increased.
13. Climate action	Greenhouse gas levels continue to rise, climate change occurring much faster than anticipated.		May2020: hottest May on record! Jun & Jul 2020: severe floods in China, Japan, India
14. Life below water	Behind other subregions.		Positive due to reduced fishing, tourism & pollution
15. Life on land	Behind other subregions. Loss of forests is slowing but continues at an alarming rate.		Would deforestation increase contact between humans and tropical animals?

What is "SDGs"?


Established in 2015, the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (UN SDGs) are 17 global goals designed to address current global challenges, including those related to climate change, social inequality and well-being, aiming to create a more sustainable future for all by 2030.

- A online action checklist for organisations to raise the awareness about SDGs and sustainable practices in a business
- Provides a tool to recognise their current good practices, identify other potentials areas and opportunities in meeting SDGs
